Our PEER Anouk Hoogendorn at London Conference in Critical Thought


08. - 09. July 2022 - Birkbeck College, University of London

Anouk will be part of the London Conference in Critical Though within the panel 'The Undercommons: Wilderness and Alternative Strategies' as part of the Art Practice and Critical Pedagogy stream.

The title of her input is 'Relaying Lures: Language in Artistic Research,' where she proposes to give a performance lecture that puts forward an exploration of words and ways that do not register in typical parameters of language and experience. This performance lecture aims to explore the difference between the lure of gifting a name and the possible reduction or violence by this very capture. How to think with both the necessity of articulating in the sense of relaying or setting out a lure for thought-thinking while not letting those fall back into a reduction of experience? How to craft conditions for the qualities of variation in the world to be felt, tending and tuning to those differences that do not register in typical parameters of what counts, of what is counted?

Research Associate For Project "Poetry In The Digital Age"

The University of Hamburg is looking for a part-time research associate within the faculty of Humanities, Institute for German Language and Literature starting on the 1st of October 2022.

The specific duties contain research in the interdisciplinary project "Poetry in the Digital Age", funded by the European

Research Council and lead by Prof. Dr. Claudia Benthien, in particular in Sub-Project 3, dealing with "Poetry and Contemporary Visual Culture". No teaching responsibilities.

The sub-project investigates contemporary forms of (audio-)visual poetry. It examines the iconic and kinetic scripts asinnovative elements of digital visual poetry and explores functions of algorithms and source code. Furthermore, the sub-projectresearches popular online phenomena, such as contemporary poetry on social media sites, focusing on the interrelation ofaesthetics and sociopolitical potentials. The research associate is particularly supposed to inquire a third, scarcely researchedobject, namely current poetry fi lms – a manifold genre of poetic image-sound combinations. The project could, for example, explore the extensive archive of Zebra Poetry Film Festival Berlin, with whom the project collaborates.

The position requires participation in research colloquia, lecture series and workshops, as well as active engagement in the ERCproject's collaborative research activities and publications.

Anti-Bias and Anti-Racist Film and Media Grant

Film and media offer profound and unique means to address and better understand issues of bias and racism. The <u>Society for Visual Anthropology</u> invites anthropological film and media makers to submit proposals for the Anti-Bias and Anti-Racist Film and Media Grant. This funding opportunity supports projects that directly address issues of prejudice and racism and/or portray visions of an anti-racist/anti-biased world.

This grant encourages new projects that experiment or take risks for investigating racism, bias and other forms of oppression or discrimination. We understand that outcomes may be unpredictable and are open to projects that may be new or untried approaches. Applicants may submit budgets up to \$1000 to be used within one year from the acceptance date. The deadline for submissions is September 15, 2022 and applicants will be informed of acceptance by the end of November 2022.
